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120.000 Belgian mines in Libya. Current location: unknown

These pictures were taken in Tripoli in August-September 2011. Stored in Salahaddin, south of the capital, were 20.000 crates

containing each six bounding AP Belgian landmines PRB-NR-442 and their fuses. <u>More info on those mines here</u>. The marks on the mines and crates indicate that they were made and probably shipped in 1973-74. The company that made those mines, "Poudrières Réunies de Belgique", went bankrupt in 1990.

On the last picture above, you can see those 120.000 anti-personnel mines being loaded on a truck. According to Peter Bouckaert, from Human Rights Watch, they were to be taken to <u>Rujban, West Libya</u>. When he asked about the destination of those mines, M. Bouckaert was presented with a document signed by the military council of Rujban.

According to some sources, those Belgian mines might have been connected to an arms-dealer, now under investigation, who tried to sold them. Asked about them, a military official from Rujban didn't denied nor confirmed that they were in the town. *"If they were transfered in Rujban, the Defense Ministry must have known about it"*, he said. In Rujban, there is a warehouse used to store weapons before the war. During the conflict, the place was emptied. A few days ago, the entry to the facility was denied to a contact of mine who believes the mines could be stored there. But so far there is no evidence of such a thing and the location of those 120.000 Belgian AP bounding mines is currently unknown.
